DORM SAFETY: 101

AVOID ELECTRICAL OVERLOAD



It's the time of year when college campuses are preparing for students moving all of their worldly possessions into their home away from home - the dorm!



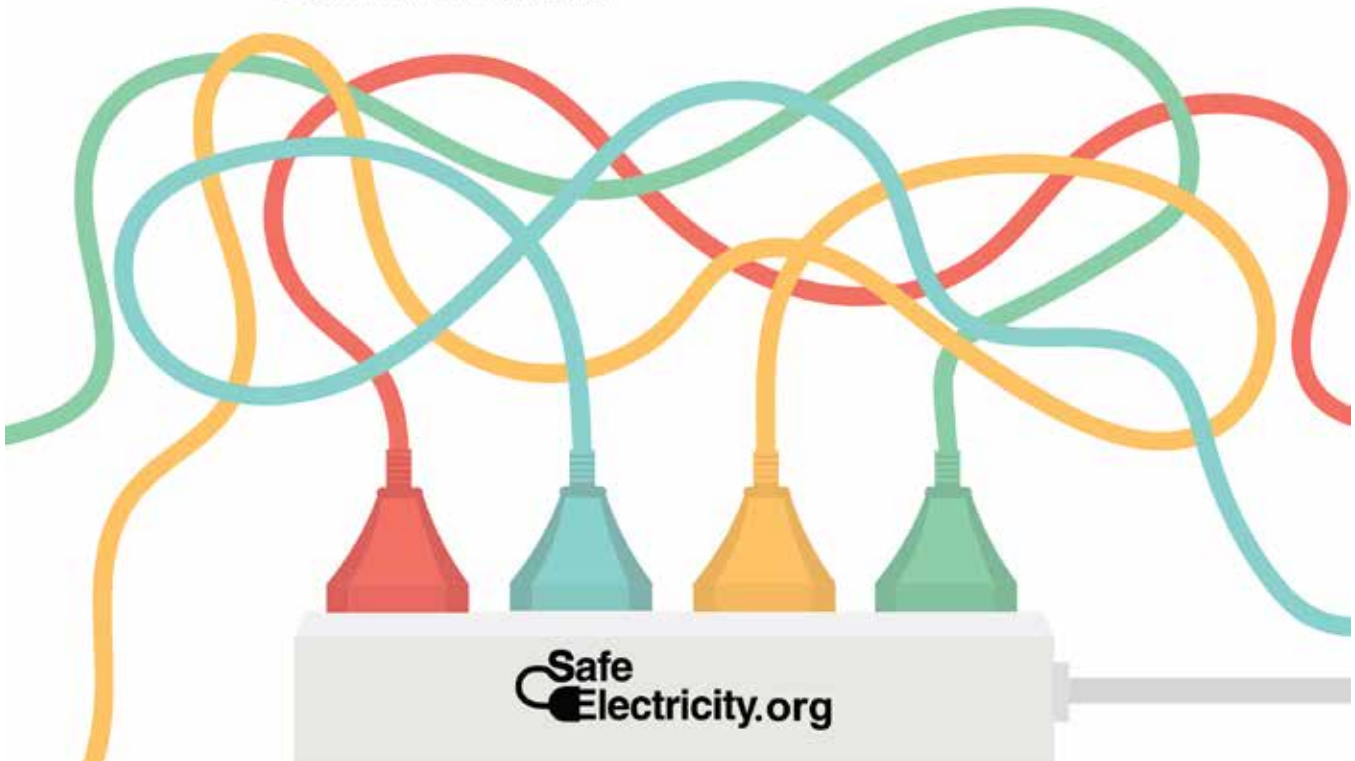
Safe Electricity urges everyone to make sure their college-bound students take precautions to prevent and protect themselves from campus-related fires and shocks. **Do not overload your electrical outlets, power strips, or extension cords.** Use power strips with an over-current protector that will shut off power automatically if there is too much current being drawn.



Potentially older wiring in student housing and apartments may not be able to handle the increased electrical demand of today's college student. If use of an appliance frequently causes power to trip off or if its power cord or the outlet feels hot, the appliance should be disconnected immediately and the condition reported to a resident assistant or housing manager.

Grant County Rural Safety Day

On Tuesday, June 18th the Grant County Rural Safety Day took place at the fairgrounds in Lancaster. The program has been held annually for many years and is open to youth in grades 2 - 8. Participants learn about: ATV Safety; Seat Belt Safety; Grain Safety; Bike Safety; Gun Safety; Boat Safety; and Drug & Tobacco Safety.

This year's demonstration was handled by Phil Schneider and Matt Rasmussen. Throughout the presentation the students learned about the following:

- Appliance and extension cord safety;
- How power lines operate and function;
- The danger of power lines and the importance of staying away;
- Underground power line safety;
- Demonstrations on tree/animal problems and electrocution hazards.

Scenic Rivers Energy Safety is our #1 priority and we want to share our electrical knowledge with our community. We want safety to be your priority as well. By sharing our knowledge through these 'hot line demonstrations' we hope the participants have a greater respect for electricity and remember to call for help during emergencies. Scam Alert



We want you to be aware of a growing phone scam that is targeting utility customers.

Phone scammers posing as your utility provider call and insist you are delinquent on your bill. They may also threaten to turn off your power, rig caller ID to make it look like the call is from your utility provider or tell you to put the money on a prepaid debit card and ask for the card number. Don't believe it.

DO NOT pay over the phone if immediate payment is demanded to avoid a disconnection. Here's what to do if the call seems suspicious:

- 1 Hang up.
- 2 Call your utility provider at the phone number on your bill.
- 3 Call the police.

Protect yourself from this and other forms of fraud.



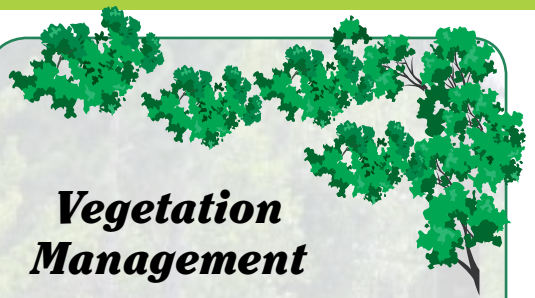
